

Government allows hard-hit sectors to deduct 30% of workers' salaries based on mutual agreement

Prime Minister and Minister of Defence Omar Razzaz on Sunday issued an announcement stipulating that the "most-damaged" economic sectors and facilities can deduct a percentage from employees' salaries for May and June, an announcement that was met with public criticism. According to the announcement, which applies to Defence Order No. 6 for 2020, the sectors most impacted by the coronavirus crisis can deduct 30 per cent of workers' salaries based on a mutual agreement involving the consent of employees working full-time both on-site and remotely. The announcement, which listed 24 sectors that can apply the decision to their businesses, also stipulates that workers who are not performing any work can have 60 per cent of their salaries deducted, with no consent required by the worker or the Labour Ministry, under the condition that their salaries do not fall below JD150 once the deduction is implemented.

Chinese gov't grants Kingdom \$750k in medical supplies for coronavirus response

The Jordanian government on Sunday received \$750,000 in medical supplies from the Chinese government in support of the Kingdom's anti-coronavirus efforts. The agreement was signed by Minister of Planning and International Cooperation Wissam Rabadi and Chinese Ambassador to Amman Pan Weifang. In a statement, the Planning Ministry said that the agreement comes within the framework of ongoing communication and coordination with donor and friendly countries and United Nations organisations to support government efforts to increase aid to combat the COVID-19 pandemic.
